





- Additional Recommendations (Limit to 1 extra)
 - Coach/Advisor
 - Music instructor
 - Administrator

SCHOOL PROFILE

Our high school profile gives context to admission departments when they are reviewing applications

- Helps schools understand:
 - What programs are offered to students
 - How your student will fit into a specific school's academic setting
 - GPA explanation
 - College Outcomes
 - Standardized Assessment Outcomes

DEFINITIONS OF ADMISSION OPTIONS IN HIGHER EDUCATION

STUDENTS: WHICH COLLEGE ADMISSION PROCESS BEST SUITS YOU?

Regular Decision

DEFINITION:

Students submit an application by a specified date and receive a decision in a clearly stated period of time.

COMMITMENT:

NON-BINDING

Rolling Admission

DEFINITION:

Institutions review applications as they are submitted and render admission decisions throughout the admission cycle.

COMMITMENT:

NON-BINDING

Early Action (EA)

DEFINITION:

Students apply early and receive a decision well in advance of the institution's regular response date.

COMMITMENT:

NON-BINDING

Students are not restricted from applying to other institutions and have until May 1 to consider their options and confirm enrollment.

Early Decision (ED)

DEFINITION:

Students make a commitment to a first-choice institution where, if admitted they definitely will enroll and withdraw all other applications. The application deadline and decision deadline occur early.

COMMITMENT:

BINDING

Restrictive Early Action (REA)

DEFINITION:

Students apply to an institution of preference and receive a decision early. They may be restricted from applying ED or EA or REA to other institutions. If offered enrollment, they have until May 1 to confirm.

COMMITMENT:

NON-BINDING

Students are responsible for determining and following restrictions.

DEADLINES VARY BY SCHOOL

TYPES OF APPLICATIONS

- Common Application (over 900 colleges)
 - Simplifies the process
 - Complete once to apply to any member college
- Individual College Application
 - Found on college website
 - Might include a SSAR (Student Self-Reported Academic Record) or SRAR (Self-Reported Academic Record)

WHAT CONSTITUTES A COMPLETE APPLICATION?

- Application (Student)
- Test Scores (Student)
 - SAT/ACT
- Application Fee (Student)
- Official Transcript (RFH Must be requested by student)
- School Profile (RFH)
- Letters of Recommendation(s) (RFH)



SUBMITTING TEST SCORES

- Test Optional & Test Free <u>FairTest.org</u>
 - Students decide whether or not they want to submit test scores with their application
- Test Flexible
 - School could allow students to submit alternate assessments
 - AP Scores
 - School Administered Assessments
- Test Blind Schools
 - SAT/ACT scores are not considered in the admission process

BALANCE IS KEY



Schools on the list should include:

- REACH (1-2) GPA is outside the average accepted range.
 The farther outside the range the higher the reach
- TARGET (5-6) A good fit academically, socially & financially. Testing & GPA are in accepted range
- LIKELY (1-2) testing & GPA are well above accepted range

Institutional need may impact all of the above

- Beginning January 13th review the 2023 2024 Course Catalog in preparation for your course selection meeting
- Junior Post-secondary Meetings begin in January to April to continue to conversation...
- Prior to the end of the Junior year students should:
 - Complete a College Search in Scoir
 - Add schools that interest them to their "prospective colleges" list
 - Contact two teachers by May 1st to request recommendations for the fall

THE COLLEGE ADMISSION PROCESS

Preparing academically, researching colleges, & understanding how colleges evaluate applicants

Admission Officers want to know that you have challenged yourself and have taken advantage of what your high school has to offer. This includes:

- Rigor of curriculum
- Course progression
- Balanced schedule to fit other responsibilities / extracurricular activities
- Grade trend

Institutions like the University of Miami & Boston College review an applicant's rigor of curriculum and academic performance in grades 9-11

Q: One student takes a regular class and gets an A. One student takes an Honors class and gets a B. Which looks better?


A: From a standpoint of taking an academically rigorous high school schedule, the more challenging Honors course is better. Of course, performance will count too.

HOW COLLEGES EVALUATE APPLICANTS



During your college application process, you will probably hear or read the phrase "holistic admission process"

A holistic review can be thought of as a three-part equation:



- Whole file: Reading the whole application. We will look at transcripts and test scores, but we will also read the extracurricular section, letters of recommendation, and essays.
- **Whole person**: *Understanding the applicant as a whole.* Through the letters, extracurriculars and essays, we will understand how the student will contribute to our community.
- **Context**: *It's all about the context*. We review your application within the context of your background, environment, and experiences. We consider the circumstances and/or educational opportunities that were available to you.

A holistic process allows us to see the best parts of who you are:

- An applicant's candidacy is evaluated on the basis of all the information provided in the application and within the context of that year's applicant pool. That includes:
 - High school transcript
 - Extracurricular activities
 - Essay responses
 - Letter(s) of recommendation
 - Test scores

HOW COLLEGES EVALUATE APPLICANTS

- High school transcript: There are two distinct factors that are considered on the transcript. The first one is the student's strength of curriculum (rigor). We will then consider how well the student did in that curriculum (grades, GPA)
- Extracurricular activities: We are looking for students who have demonstrated
 they have been change agents and leaders within their community. We are
 especially interested in those students we believe will contribute to, as well as
 benefit from, our community
- **Essay responses**: Don't just write what you think we're looking for. Pick the prompt that best fits you and make it as personal and true to you as possible. Teach us something that we didn't learn from the other parts of your application
- Letter(s) of recommendation: choose someone who can speak on your character
 whether inside or outside of the classroom environment
- Test scores: Some colleges are test-optional, other require either the SAT or the ACT (<u>Fairtest.org</u>)

RESEARCHING COLLEGES & FINDING YOUR "FIT"



You will often hear people talking about a school being "the right fit," but how do you determine that?

Ask yourself what's important to you?

- Size: do you want a big school or a small school?
- Location: do you want to be in a city or in a suburb?
- Distance from home: do you want to be close to home or venture away?
- Majors / programs: do they have what you want to study?
- Diversity: who makes up the student body?
- Clubs & organizations: how can I get involved?
- School spirit: do you want to cheer your school on at football games?
- Career development: how do they support students in preparing for their careers?

Narrow it down

- Visit campus: it's not always possible to step foot on campus before applying, but if you have the opportunity to visit, make note of where you feel most comfortable. Also try virtual campus tours
- Talk to current students / alumni: find someone and hear their true experiences. You can also reach out to an admission counselor for more information
- Think long term: college will direct you toward your future career. Find a school that has a career center and resources on campus to help you get to where you want to go
- Be realistic about your family's finances. Ask the right questions.
